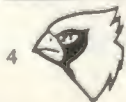

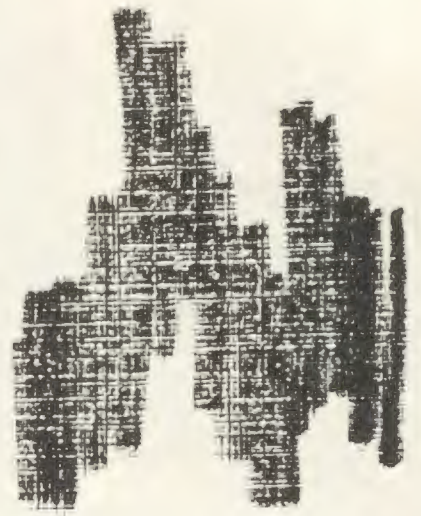

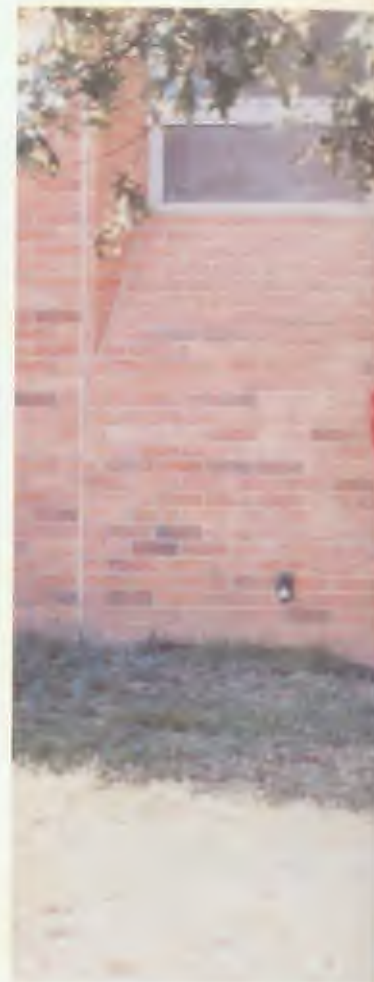
Popular accessory trends are gold fronts, nose earrings, coach bags, Fendi bags, L.A. Raiders caps and designer ties!

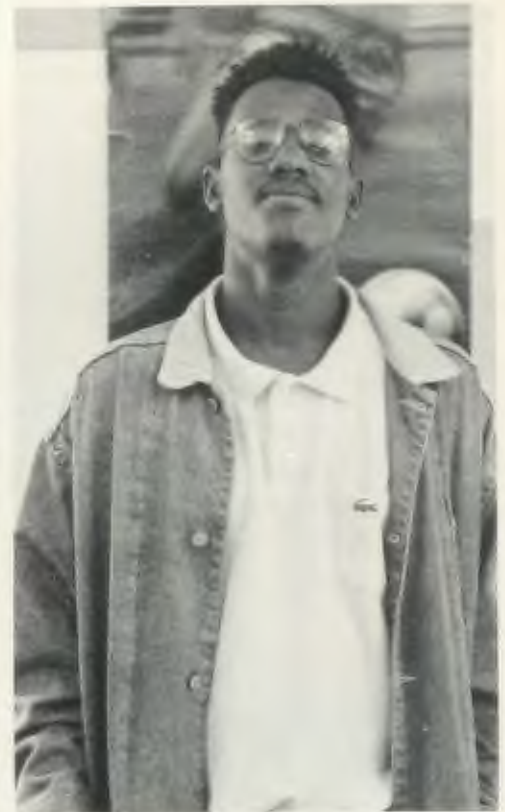
Establishing firm ground for a successful school life is important for all students, and it begins in the ninth

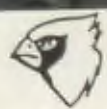

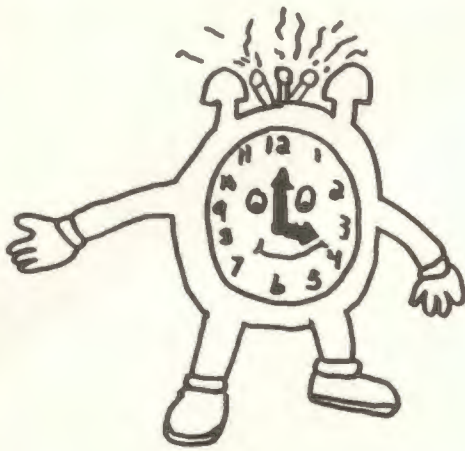

Once again, Shaw head librarian, Ms. Jackie Avery and her committee, organized an excellent variety of activities to commemorate Black History Month. Students and teachers were offered a wide range of presentations which explored this year's theme — "Studying our past, Striding towards the future, Surmounting our Challenges," activities included seminars, and art contest, an exhibit by the U.S. Navy, lunch time videos, assemblies and daily P.A. announcements.

The seminar series introduced students to positive role models to help develop a sense of pride within themselves and their heritage. It was hoped that the series would motivate students to face, and overcome the challenges ahead. Speakers included our own principal, Mr. Lloyd, as well as Mr. Mack, social studies. Other speakers included: Dr. Sylvester Davis, who spoke on the African roots of African American families; Selrien Haygood from the U.S. District Court, Allen Haff, Friendly Inn Settlement House, Tyrone McBee, East Ohio Gas, Gregory Resse, East Cleveland Public Library, John Addison, Educator, Henry Ford, Ford and Associates, and Dr. Marvin McMickle, President of Cleveland NAACP. In addition, Ms. Leslie Clark, Ms. Sandra Austin and Ms. Deforia Lane represented the medical field.

In an effort to include a larger number of students in the celebration of African American History and Culture, the art department sponsored a contest along with the school and East Cleveland libraries. It reflected the "Black Artistic Experience." Participation was part of a class project. In addition, it gave the students the opportunity to have their work more widely exhibited.

The United States Navy set up an exhibit in Korb Lounge that depicts the history and contributions of African Americans in the United States Navy. It included portraits, pictures and paintings as well as a video display.

Teachers were requested to submit student writings about the African American experience for submission to the Call & Post for inclusion in their special supplements.

Finally, students were treated to P.A. announcements which informed them about facts and people. Students could also view episodes of "Eyes on the Prize II" in Korb during their lunch periods.

Hat's off to Mrs. Avery and the committee for a truly memorable and exciting Black History month program. You've started many on the road to learning.

## *Guide the Way to the Future*



**Medgar Evers**, field secretary of the Mississippi NAACP, was assassinated with a high-powered rifle in front of his Jackson, Miss. home in 1961 at the height of his struggle to desegregate public facilities in Jackson. A white segregationist Mississippi Citizens Council member, Byron de la Beckwith, who was charged with the crime, after his fingerprints were found on the rifle, was acquitted in 1964 in a subsequent trial.



**Malcolm X**, national spokesman for the Nation of Islam until his exodus from the religion sect in 1964, was assassinated in 1965 in New York City by black gunmen of undetermined affiliation while addressing followers of the newly-formed Organization for Afro-American Unity. At time of his death, the radical leader was waging efforts aimed at urging U. S. Muslim flight before the United Nations General Assembly.

## The Martin Luther King Winner Miss Akia Foster

Dr. King would have been proud of Akia. She has consistently been a top placer in speech tournaments and is a member of the National Honor Society. She is a fine example of African American womanhood.

The Renaissance Festival, supervised by Ms. Carol Blaha, encourages senior students to immerse themselves in one of the most exciting periods of history.

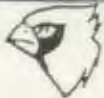
The Renaissance was a

Looking for a new career? The Cosmetology department may be the place to start your search!





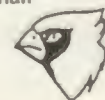





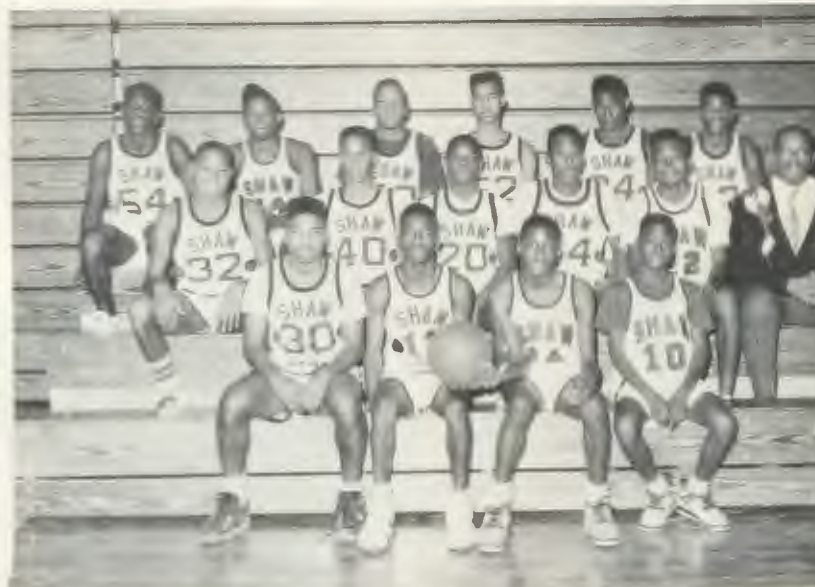

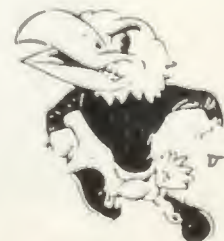

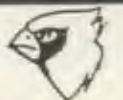

Shaw High produces two publications, the Cardinal Approach and the Shuttle Yearbook

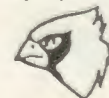
This year Mr. Tolbert's journalism class was more exciting than ever. That is because new columns were added. Such as:

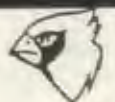

JOGS is an excellent program for anyone seeking the working world after graduation.

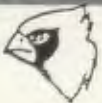


## Trade & Industry Jobs for the Future

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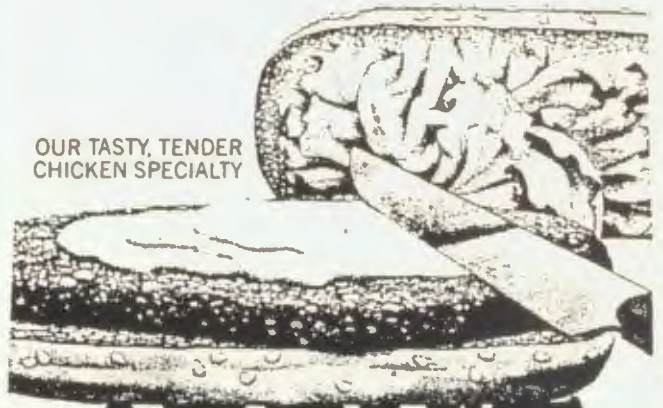
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## A Word of Thanks

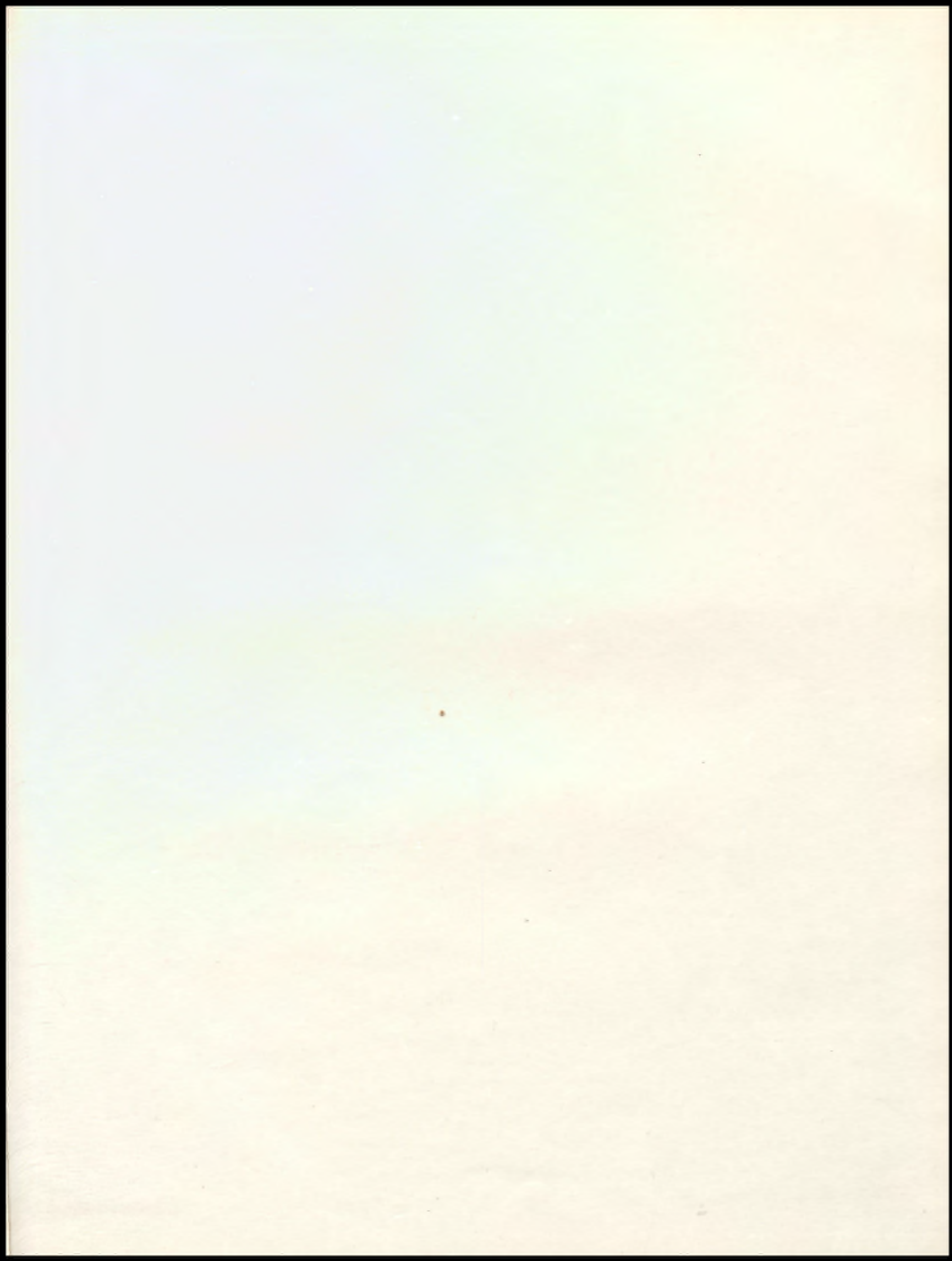

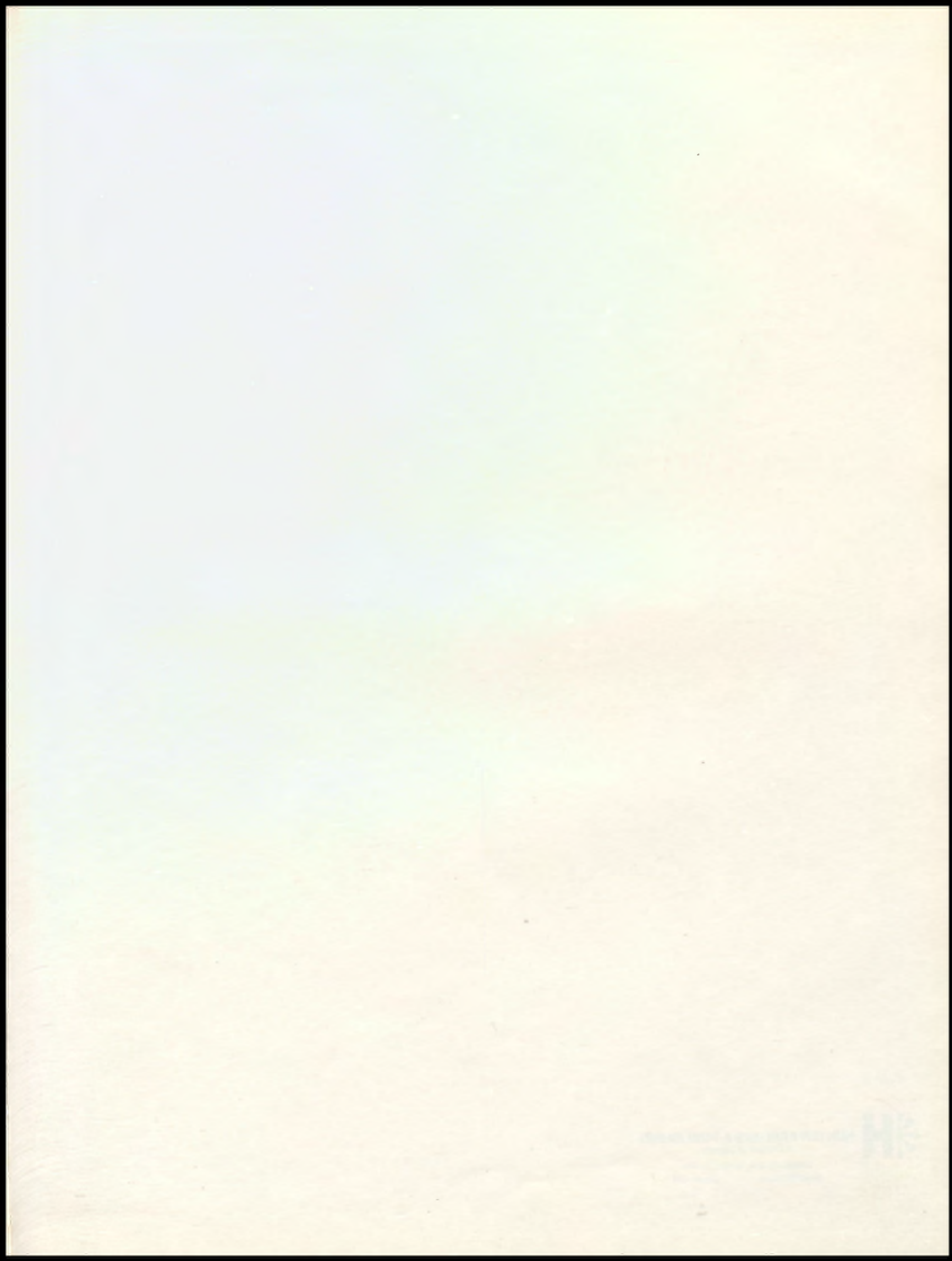
